## SUCCESSFUL MEDIATION BY LEGAL AID SOUTH AFRICA LEADS TO WITHDRAWN CHARGES AGAINST UNIVERSITY OF THE FREE STATE WORKERS

Legal Aid South Africa welcomes the decision by the National Prosecuting Authority in the Free State to withdraw the charges against all 39 workers from the University of the Free State (UFS) who were arrested on 22 February 2016.

The striking UFS workers were protesting against outsourcing and also claimed that they were not being paid the wages promised to them following last year's 'Fees Must Fall' protests. These workers were then arrested for illegally gathering but were later released on bail in order to allow for further investigations.

Legal Aid South Africa's Bloemfontein Justice Centre Executive Mr Machini Motloung, Principal Attorney Moeketsi Moeketsi and Candidate Attorney Odwa Ngombane were on record as legal representatives of the 39 workers.

Their case was on the roll at the Bloemfontein District Court yesterday, 14 June. However, Legal Aid South Africa's defense team managed to ensure that the charges against the workers were withdrawn. This was subsequent to engagement meetings held between Legal Aid South Africa lawyers and the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions in the Free State.

The workers are very appreciative of the legal representation provided by Legal Aid South Africa.

Such matters represent our ongoing commitment to fulfilling our mandate as set out in the Legal Aid South Africa Act (39 of 2014) and Section 35 of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa.
